Alumni Spotlight // Asma M. Moheet, MD

Asma M. Moheet, MD (N'08) completed a Neurovascular and Neurocritical Care fellowship at UCSF after residency, and came to the realization that she couldn't leave beautiful California after that! She is currently full-time faculty in Neurocritical Care at Cedars-Sinai Medical Center in Los Angeles, CA. Her responsibilities include serving as Associate Director of the Neuroscience ICU and Director of the Neurocritical Care Fellowship Program. She is one of 5 neurointensivists in a busy, 24-bed ICU. Although her clinical duties can be quite demanding, she finds fulfillment in



taking care of patients with acute neurologic conditions and helping them and their families navigate the challenges of their disease.

"Most of my patients experience sudden and unexpected life-altering neurologic conditions that may significantly impact their quality of life. My job is to help them survive and recover, and in cases where recovery within their goals isn't possible to help guide and support them and their family during a very difficult and stressful time."

One of the things she most enjoys about her current role is resident and fellow education, and she thrives on interactions with her trainees. On the national level, Dr. Moheet is an active member of the Neurocritical Care Society, serving as Co-Chair of the newly founded Quality Committee and Co-Chair of the Educational Products Marketing Committee, and has a forthcoming book (preliminarily titled the "NCS Neurocritical Care Pocket Guide". When not busy with her clinical, teaching, and academic endeavors Asma enjoys learning all about toddlerhood from her amazing daughter, Doah, with her incredible husband Khurram, and eating good food. Asma is our Neurology Specialty Director for the Alumni Board of Directors.

Physicians Urged to Sign up for Doximity

Doximity is the largest and fastest-growing medical network in the country, with more than 60 percent of all U.S. physicians as members. Physicians across all specialties use Doximity to connect with other physicians. Since 2014, U.S. News & World Report has used the network as the primary voting mechanism for its annual "Best Hospitals" ranking.

Physicians enrolled in Doximity receive an initial email invitation with a link to a survey, which asks them to supply the names of up to five hospitals in their specialty that provide the best care to patients with serious conditions, regardless of location or expense.

In addition, eligible Doximity members receive alerts inviting them to participate when they log on or use the Doximity app.

Claiming your profile is simple and only takes a few minutes. Just visit Doximity.com or download the free mobile app. You will need to complete the physician verification process and create a secure login. Please finish the process by Dec. 1, to give us the best voting opportunity.

Cleveland Clinic mourns the passing of **Thomas Gretter, MD**

Thomas Gretter, MD, a well-known and beloved Cleveland Clinic neurologist for more than half a century, died April 4, 2017 at the age of 81. Over the course of his career at Cleveland Clinic, he helped launch Cleveland Clinic's first quality assurance and utilization review initiatives, and chaired key committees. A skilled diagnostician, he was highly regarded for his technical and treatment planning skills.

"Dr. Gretter played a singular role in the history of the Department of Neurology and the life of the Cleveland Clinic," says Andre Machado, MD, PhD, Chair of the Neurological Institute. "He was beloved by his patients and admired by our trainees. He inspired us all with this energy and intelligence. He will be greatly missed."



Dr. Gretter was born in Fargo, North Dakota, and earned his medical degree at the University of Pennsylvania. He interned at Milwaukee County Hospital and did a residency in Neurology at the State University of Iowa Hospitals. He came to Cleveland Clinic from the University of West Virginia Medical Center in 1966.

In the 1970s, Dr. Gretter helped Cleveland Clinic establish its formal quality, accreditation and utilizations efforts. He was Cleveland Clinic's first Quality Assurance Officer, and served as associate director of Professional Staff Affairs. He was Chair of the Utilization Review Committee, and served on the Hospital Committee, Audit Committee, and Records and Statistics among many other committee appointments. He also served on the Board of Trustees.

Outside the Cleveland Clinic, he served on the Peer Review Committee of the Academy of Medicine and the Executive Committee of the Physicians' Peer Review Organization. He was a member of numerous professional societies, and chaired the United Way Committee, among his many charitable activities.



Dr. Gretter embraced new technology and evolving practices, and recently joined a team of six neurologists performing tele-neurology visits from his office.

He is survived by his wife, Joan, a former social worker at Cleveland Clinic, and three sons, one of whom, Brock Gretter, MD, is a member of the Cleveland Clinic professional staff.
