the expertise of Cleveland Clinic's health system. We will implement shared best practices to provide high-quality service in a safe environment, which will lead to a positive patient experience. We will bring the specialists who helped us achieve *U.S. News & World Report's* No. 1 ranking among all hospitals in Broward County. In addition, we will integrate our services with our Parkland office to maximize efficiency and convenience for our patients in the community.

What will the new facility include?

The brand-new, 73,000-square-foot facility will offer premier surgical and imaging services, six operating rooms (four initially), two endoscopy suites, CT/MRI, mammography and X-ray imaging, 40 exam rooms and 24 prep/recovery bays.

What types of surgeries will be performed there?

A wide range, including breast, colorectal, general, gynecological, hand, orthopaedic, ear, nose and throat, plastic, urological, vascular, and foot and ankle surgery.

When will the new facility be opened?

We expect to start seeing patients this August.

A LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT



Dear Friends:

We're in an exciting era for Cleveland Clinic Florida — one marked by significant expansion and service enhancements that allow us to provide excellent care to a growing number of South Florida residents and visitors.

Before I share the highlights of these many thrilling developments, I'd like to acknowledge our 30th anniversary this year. Cleveland Clinic Florida opened its doors in 1988 at our original location in Fort Lauderdale, and since then, we've never stopped striving to provide the high-quality care that our patients have come to expect. It is the reputation of our care and service, based on three decades of medical advances and innovations, as well as Cleveland Clinic's legacy of nearly 100 years of excellence, that has brought us to today's extraordinary growth.

The physical expansion currently underway at Cleveland Clinic Florida includes our new 221,000-square-foot hospital tower in Weston and the 73,000-square-foot Family Health Center in Coral Springs, both scheduled to open this summer, as well as our newly opened medical office in Wellington. We've also added an innovative Palm Beach Physical Therapy Suite to our Palm Beach Gardens office to help patients who need rehabilitation after an illness, injury or medical procedure.

In January, we launched our new Concierge Medicine program based in the Las Olas neighborhood of East Fort Lauderdale, the first of its kind for Cleveland Clinic. Led by board-certified internist Nabil Tadross, MD, the program provides highly personalized medical care, while cultivating in-depth patient-physician relationships that support patients' health goals. Concierge Medicine members receive comprehensive and coordinated care, extended appointments with a personal physician, and direct physician communication available 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

We've also extended our reach northward to Stuart, Florida, by forming a cardiac partnership with Martin Health System. We're sharing best practices in cardiology and heart surgery, optimizing superior patient-centered care, and developing programs to improve quality, safety and outcomes with this nonprofit, community-based healthcare organization that has served Florida's Treasure Coast for more than 75 years.

About 35 miles up the coast in Vero Beach, the Indian River County Hospital District trustees selected Cleveland Clinic to take over the county-owned Indian River Medical Center. Trustees mentioned our reputation, innovation, efficiency, patient-centered care, and ability to attract and retain leading doctors and other healthcare providers as factors that ultimately led them to choose Cleveland Clinic over other hospitals and health systems in the bidding process.

With this rapid growth, Cleveland Clinic Florida remains true to our mission of providing better care of the sick, investigation into their problems, and further education of those who serve. This is demonstrated by our role as a major referral center, caring for many of the more complex patients from South Florida and beyond. In fact, our patient acuity rating, a measure of the average severity of the cases we treat, recently reached a high of 2.25. This puts us on par with nationally ranked hospitals around the country.

Please accept my deepest appreciation for helping Cleveland Clinic Florida achieve our goals as we strive to meet the growing needs of the patients and communities we serve.

GENEROUS GIFTS ADVANCE MEDICAL EDUCATION

For Howard Ternes of Jupiter, Florida, open heart surgery at Cleveland Clinic Florida was so successful that he and his wife, Margery, became supporters in 2010, and since then have made a number of gifts totaling more than \$750,000 to support Cardiology's medical education program.

Their philanthropic support is especially significant because it addresses the acute shortage of medical school training positions throughout the United States.

This shortage is due to funding cuts that were made 20 years ago to medical specialty training programs. As a result, there's a shortage of skilled specialists at a time when there is a greater need for their services.

"Demands for medical specialists are rising dramatically, and yet, significant resources and many years of education are required to produce one medical specialist," says Cleveland Clinic Florida CEO and President Wael Barsoum, MD, who expressed gratitude for the Ternes' generous support of crucial medical education.

"In 2014, the youngest baby boomers in the United States turned 50, bringing the number of adults over age 50 to 100 million," Dr. Barsoum says. "A greater number of older Americans means there is a greater demand for specialists to treat diseases commonly seen in older patients, including heart disease."

Robert Cubeddu, MD, Director of Cardiology, notes that heart and vascular research and education are critical to understanding the underlying causes of heart disease and to developing new treatments and cures.

"Education is essential for training the next generation of cardiovascular specialists," Dr. Cubeddu says. "Cleveland Clinic Florida is immensely grateful for the generosity of Howard and Margery Ternes and other supporters who are ensuring that our program is thriving in these key areas."

The couple was moved to support the program after Mr. Ternes' stellar experience in 2010 at Cleveland Clinic Florida in Weston. "From an impressive ICU, to the superb team of medical caregivers, to the staff who cleaned the rooms, they were all friendly, attentive and professional," he says.

Mr. Ternes had heart bypass and stent surgeries at a hospital near his home, and when he continued to have heart problems a few years later, he was referred to Howard Bush, MD, an interventional cardiologist at Cleveland Clinic Florida. After an initial meeting and medical review, Dr. Bush conferred with colleague Edward Savage, MD, a Cleveland Clinic Florida cardiothoracic surgeon. Together, they decided that Mr. Ternes should have open heart surgery, which took place three weeks later.

"We were so impressed by what we saw, and particularly in light of our previous heart surgery," Mr. Ternes says. "Because we understand that there is a grave shortage of physicians, we feel that continued training of our future heart leaders at Cleveland Clinic Florida is important."

Mrs. Ternes agrees. "The doctors are so passionate about educating those who serve in the medical field. After speaking with Dr. Bush and Dr. Savage, we understood that one of the reasons they wanted to practice at a teaching hospital is that they would always have the opportunity to teach and learn from the young physicians seeking specialized training in the heart and vascular field."

MANGURIAN FOUNDATION GIFT LAUNCHES SIMULATION CENTER

When the late Harry T. Mangurian, Jr., was diagnosed with acute myeloid leukemia (AML), few treatment options were available. To revolutionize treatments and care, he and his foundation sought to provide resources to a number of leading research institutions.

In 1999, Mr. Mangurian and Dorothy, his wife of 62 years, established The Harry T. Mangurian, Jr. Foundation, focusing on advancing causes in health, higher education and hospital care.

Although Mr. and Mrs. Mangurian passed away in 2008 and 2015, respectively, their legacy of compassion lives on through their foundation's philanthropy. Recently, the foundation made a gift of \$2 million to create The Harry T. Mangurian, Jr. Simulation Center in Weston. This center is a crucial resource for medical caregivers seeking to build and maintain their skills.

Working with simulation mannequins, caregivers will experience a number of scenarios, from routine

to unusual. By leveraging advanced technology, the simulations will provide an opportunity to work as a team and receive immediate feedback in a safe environment. The new suite will provide realistic settings, including an emergency department trauma bay, a full-scale operating room and a critical care (ICU) room.

"We are pleased to provide this support to establish the Simulation Center at the Weston Campus. This center not only will provide learning opportunities for medical students, but also for nurses, techs, EMS, firefighters and others in the medical community," says Stephen Mehallis, President of The Harry T. Mangurian, Jr. Foundation.

The Harry T. Mangurian, Jr. Simulation Center is in the design stage. Groundbreaking is planned this spring, and the center is scheduled to open this summer.

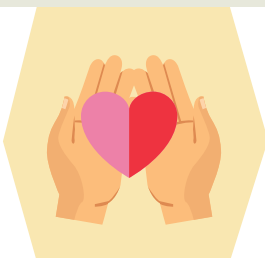

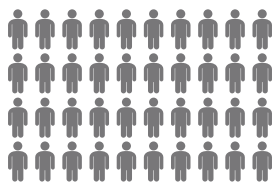

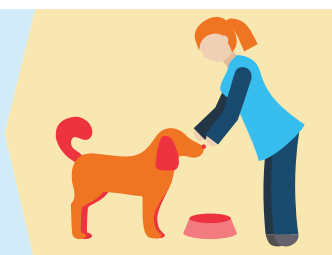
