Interprofessional Learner-led Quality Improvement in a Primary Care Office

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Background

Transformative Care Continuum (TCC)

- Cleveland Clinic Lakewood Center for Family Medicine (CFM) is a primary care office and Family Medicine residency program
- Partnered with Ohio University Heritage College of Osteopathic Medicine (OUHCOM) to integrate TCC medical students into the office in a UME/GME six year curriculum
- An interprofessional team of educators, including physicians, a nurse and a pharmacist, was developed to build and execute a population health and quality improvement (QI) curriculum supported by Macy Grant funds

Methods

Creating a Culture

Team Strategies and Tools to Enhance Performance and Patient Safety (TeamSTEPPS) was utilized to foster a culture that is supportive of learner growth

Assuring Success

- Projects aligned with enterprise goals
- QI request form was created to identify key stakeholders and office resources required

Fostering Autonomy

- TCC students received basic project management training taught by OUHCOM Health Systems Science faculty
- Consistent CFM interprofessional mentors available for coaching to promote project momentum and task delegation

Preparing the Team: Quality Improvement Education

Institute for Healthcare Improvement (IHI) Modules

- Online QI training Modules
- Team members: medical students, residents, TCC faculty

Lean Six Sigma Yellow Belt Workshop

 Two day interactive session • Team members: TCC faculty, nursing, PSS, administration

Interactive Group Didactics

- Weekly interactive lectures led by Health Systems Science faculty member from OUHCOM
- **Team members:** medical students, TCC pharmacy and nursing faculty

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
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Results

Two completed QI projects focused on nursing intake process

- Improved completion of medication reconciliation sheet from 66% to 93%
- Improved completion of Hypertension follow-up sheet from 32% to 69%

Four QI projects in process focused on ACO measures including, colorectal cancer screening and diabetes management



Discussion

- Using a similar approach to enhance resident QI education and project success
- Prepared staff to participate in resident led, office wide QI projects
- Learners are prepared to lead interprofessional QI teams as future residents and physicians
