Cleveland Clinic Children's Center for Autism is a leading program dedicated to autism treatment, education and research. It includes the Lerner School for Autism and center-based outpatient services such as diagnostic evaluations, speech/language, occupational and applied behavioral analysis therapies (behavior therapy). The center provides services from the earliest age of diagnosis through 21 years of age. A number of federally funded clinical research studies are also underway.

Physical, occupational and speech/language therapists serve infants and children through age 21 at six different locations. Recreational, art and music therapists and adaptive equipment specialists are also available to provide support. Physical, occupational and speech/language therapists serve infants and children through age 21, with assistance from recreational, art and music therapists and adaptive equipment specialists. Cleveland Clinic Children's therapists treat the most complex conditions in specialized clinics, focusing on constraint-induced movement therapy, feeding disorders, seating and wheelchair therapy, and upper extremity disorders.

Feeding disorders develop from a combination of medical/physiological, developmental, behavioral and psychosocial factors. As many as 25% of children experience some type of feeding difficulty during infancy or early childhood. The incidence can be as high as 33% for children with developmental disabilities.

The Day Therapy Program at Cleveland Clinic Children's Hospital for Rehabilitation offers intensive therapy without requiring an overnight stay. Children receive a combination of medical, nursing and therapy services during the day, and return home each evening and weekend.
